"Best Ever" 'A' Level Results

Wath Comprehensive School's Sixth Form students are celebrating some outstanding 'A' level results. The school has set itself a new record pass rate: 92.2% A-E, compared with 90.6% 1997, and a national figure of 87.8%. Of the 118 candidates who took 'A' level this Summer, a remarkable 37.9% obtained grades A or B, compared with 30.2% last year, there was a 100% pass rate in 13 out of the 25 subjects. This year's 'A' level results represent a significant improvement on the already high standards normally achieved by the school.

Headteacher Mr Godber commented "I am delighted with what our students have achieved, it reflects very well on their hard work and commitment and that of their teachers and means that the vast majority will have obtained places at the Universities of their choice. These results confirm the place of Wath as a centre of 'A' level excellence in South Yorkshire".

The Head of Sixth said, "Never before have so many students been immediately accepted onto their first choice universities, leaving very few student placements to finalise, another extremely pleasing year". **DIARY DATES**

The aim is to enable at least 20 students to begin the Gold Award and complete before they leave in June 2000. There will be a launch in September when Phil Brown (Olympic 400m runner) and other celebrities will be in school.

The award has five sections:

Selwyn, Cambridge

Interesting statistics from Selwyn College, Cambridge! Over the past decade Selwyn College has had on average one student per year from the Sixth Form. Given that they only accept 100 students per year in total, Wath accounts for 1% of its entry. Not bad for a comp! (and we have lots of students who go to other colleges). We are a "model school" according to one source in Cambridge.

Tuition fees

Major changes are in progress in the funding of Higher Education, which is a worry for a school like Wath which traditionally sends some 90% of its Upper Sixth to university or college. From October 1998 many students will have to pay £1000 per year in tuition fees and from 1999 the maintenance grant is being scrapped. Loans are now replacing grants and the future might look a bit frightening for our Sixth Formers. We have 95 Year 13 students applying to university for this October and we wish them every success both academically and financially!

Wath Comprehensive Students Represent Rotherham at Regional Science Conference

Six Wath students travelled to Sheffield Hallam University on Friday 19th December 1997 to participate in the Pupil Researcher Initiative Conference. A group of three girls from Y11 gave a talk about rates of reaction and a group of three boys gave a talk about electromagnetism.

No other Rotherham schools were represented. The students were able to listen to other presentations and talks in the morning by other students. After lunch in the University refectory, the students were entertained by and enlightened scientifically by PhD students who were currently working at the forefront of science.

The topics covered included: "Photochemistry", "Parkinsons Disease", "Quarks and Gluons" and the final lecture was given by Prof. Charles Stirling (of Christmas Lecture fame).

The Magley presenters (Ian Watson, Chris Webb and Javid Mahdavi) were awarded a certificate of excellence.

All students enjoyed the experience and were excellent ambassadors for the school.

Our partnership has decided to take Social Issues Concerning Schools as our theme, beginning with Employment and the changing pattern of the job

market. This will involve looking at regeneration in the area, training possibilities, equal opportunities and selfawareness.

Our joint study will develop further in the three years of the project fostering links through learning and friendship using electronic communication, fax and the postal service. With this project, links are being forged with schools in other European countries promoting an awareness of young people and the problems they face today. The skills needed to research, collate and exchange information with pupils within the partnership will be developed via funding from Socrates Chapter II, Comenius Action 1.



Pakistan 1998

Once again, pupils from Wath Comprehensive School have had the opportunity to link with the expedition to Pakistan.

Zoe Priselac, Carine Evans and Claire Reeves joined the group which visited the busy cities of Islamabad and Rawalpindi, along with the contrasting rural sea-side town of Murray. Initially, meetings preparing the girls for snakes, giant mosquitoes and chronic diarrhoea were held, the words "Don't forget the Immodium" ringing in their ears!

Zoe reports that one of the most memorable occasions for her was the touching visit to the SOS village in Islamabad which is the equivalent to an orphanage youth hostel. She said that most of the group expected the place to be in an appalling condition. However the opposite was the case - the buildings were beautifully kept, surrounded by flourishing gardens. Classrooms, a mosque and organised family structures were all in place, catering for all the physical and emotional needs of the orphans.

Trident Broadens Horizons

"Work Experience" at Wath Comprehensive started as long ago as 1977 when it was organised by Mr Keith Bareham and Mr Terry Deeley. At the time the arrangement was staggered so that 40 pupils were out of school four times during the year. Two staff visited the pupils between them!

Since then the process has "blossomed" so that now it is general policy in Rotherham Borough Education that every pupil is involved in the Trident scheme. Mr Trevor Baggaley as present Head of Careers began the annual process as far back as Summer 1997. In his own words, "All guns have been blazing from mid-May'98."

The obvious effect of Trident on our pupils is that it makes them more responsible for their own learning, and the evidence is that it carries forward into their attitude on their return to school, and into Year 11. Many of them can see more clearly the relevance of school. They can witness at first hand that in a job, training situations are on-going, and they encounter new qualifications that the work force are working towards, other than GCSEs. They also realise that the working day is a much longer day than school hours, and often report back on how tiring they find simply being at work, on their feet for longer hours, with greater spans of concentration. They enjoy being "treated like adults."

This year, as ever, there is a broad spectrum of experiences awaiting our pupils, from life as a farm-hand at Wentworth Family Farm, to witnessing first hand how the Rotherham Magistrates Court operates.

Aron Green and Nicky Oxley will be staying at RAF Newton near Nottingham. Both belong to the Air Training Corps and look forward to sampling life in the RAF. Richard Kinsella will also travel to Nottingham to work alongside the Assistant Network Officer in the IT section of Nottingham County Council, a position organised for him by his family. Beth Wilcock also organised her own Trident after seeing an advertisement in a Trident magazine in a Christian Fellowship hostel in Cumbria.

An exciting time lies ahead for Richard Leighton and Katie Mitchell. Both will be travelling by air to their Trident experience. Richard will jet off to Portugal as a team member for the England U17 Water Polo team. Whilst there he will join the coaching staff and spend his time learning the training methods of different countries. Katie, meanwhile will join brother Jon Mitchell, an ex Wath Comprehensive pupil, at Nokia, Oula, Finland. Jon, a Software Design Engineer at Nokia has organised a Trident Place for Katie in the Telecommunications Section. She will be helping in the IT area presently building a new telecommunications system for West Germany. Wherever these pupils carry out their Trident, near or far, the experiences gained will certainly benefit them in the future.

European Awareness Week 15-17th July 1998 European Awareness Week was an exciting opportunity for both pupils and staff to explore different aspects on the European theme.

Sessions were offered on many topics including Italian cuisine, European folk music, Norman

architecture (examples to be found in Wath!), language links, dramatic sketches, scientific pursuit, Russian, Italian, Spanish and German courses, European customs, The European Union, rebuilding well known sites in Europe, the Romans and much more. There were quizzes, sports and boules competitions and even trips to local airports to explore European aviation communication. For those lunching in the canteen, the menu showed a European influence! The event has been documented by pupils working on the Internet and producing our own newspaper. An event thoroughly enjoyed by all.
