
41 pupils and Miss Huggup,

The following week, at the Regional Awards held at the Tankersley Manor Hotel, the company was the South Yorkshire winner of the Quality Award for Administration. 'Beth Shalom' Holocaust Memorial Centre "He who saves a single life saves the world entire"

Studying a foreign language isn't just about learning the words and how to use them. It's also about learning about the culture, ways of life and history of a country, and as such, students at Wath are given the opportunity to participate in a number of useful trips, both abroad and at home. At the beginning of this school year, a number of Year 9 and 12 German students, myself included, took part in an emotional visit to the Beth Shalom Holocaust Memorial Centre in Nottinghamshire.

Few school trips are quite so memorable, but this one (and, so I'm told, the visit to the battlefields of the Somme in Belgium) remain with their participants for a long time, and it's easy to see why...

The exhibition shows the horrific struggle and hardship endured by the Jews during the 2nd World War in Nazi-occupied countries, and is not for the faint-hearted, with some very graphic photographs of families and individuals in the concentration camps, along with anti-Semitist posters and notices. As you enter the exhibition, a

tall pillar bears the word "Remember", and lists the surnames of Jewish families who died at the hands of the Nazis, along with photos in the shape of the star of David. There is a whole wall depicting the town of Bendzin, with the awakening phrase "one town among many". Then, there are scenes of the Nazis' rise to power, and propaganda material of the 'Third Reich'. Moving on through the exhibition, there is a mock shop front, with broken windows and wrecked contents, and the word 'Jude' (German for 'Jew') written across it, in a representation of Kristallnacht, a night in September 1938 during which the windows of all Jewishowned shops were broken, and the contents looted, such was the hatred of the Jews.

Throughout the exhibition, there are quotes and snippets of text from survivors, which help to put everything into context. On one wall further into the exhibition are the words from above the gates of the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp, "Arbeit macht frei" - 'Work makes freedom'. There are many strong and moving photos all through the exhibition, showing the inside of the gas chambers, and the trains full of Jews. These are some of the more pleasant images - for example, the caption to one

reads "Child pulling a cart with a dead body on it", whilst others are simply too horrific to describe.

As dramatic as these images are, the most emotive are those nearer to the beginning, those showing the families before the war, having fun, just like any other, either at that time or today, and that it could easily be any of us in the same situation. These poor people, who were subjected to such awful acts of cruelty, purely on the grounds of their beliefs, were human beings, yet treated like animals.

It should not be forgotten, that there were other Jews, who fled and went into hiding, in order to escape the persecution, and were forced to spend their days in a few small rooms, not making a sound, and unable to go outside, in order to remain undetected. Most people have heard of Anne Frank, whose family was found and killed just days before the end of the war, and whose diary survived, and was subsequently published, telling the true story of the emotions, problems and worries experienced in hiding. It portrays the immense stress placed upon those in hiding, not even being able to look out of a window. These people too, are represented by the centre.

Outside there is a fitting memorial garden, with roses planted to commemorate the dead.

The most interesting and enthralling part of the trip was hearing the account of two people, who escaped to England and survived the Holocaust. It's hard enough to believe that the Nazis could have such a hatred of the Jews, but even more amazing that two people who have been through such an appalling experience can be such truly good people, and they set an example for us all.

Some of the photographs from the visit are on display on the French corridor, opposite L7. Please feel free to ask me or any other Y12 German students, and I'm sure Miss Williamson will be only too pleased to answer any questions!! Jonathan Welch Y12

On the 9th of May, former pupil, David Knowles, came back to school to talk to Y12 and Yl3 Physics students about Physics at degree level and the work he is doing at the moment. David is a particle physicist who studied Physics at Lancaster University and is now working towards a PhD at Birmingham University. As part of his research, he frequently travels to California to use one of the world's most advanced particle accelerators, the Stanford Linear Accelerator, situated in San Francisco.

David talked at length to Y12 and Y13 bringing life to the 'A' level syllabus. He explained that his own 'A' level results had not been brilliant, but having been accepted to read Physics at Lancaster, he has not looked back since. The Italian Job! Technology goes to Sicily

A possible new venture for Graphic Products in the Technology department will commence February 2001. Through Central Bureau and Lingua Action E, a group of Y10 Graphic Products students will be given a unique opportunity to work with a Sicilian school, Liceo Classico Statale.

Over an academic year, the two schools will work on a joint project to design and manufacture a product. Students from both countries will be given language tuition and will take part in a two-week exchange to the partner institution. The project will be partly financed through the Central Bureau.

Lingua Action E will provide, through the project, a greater understanding of culture and language for the students and it will highlight the similarities between our teenage population.

This year the 'A' level Spanish group, accompanied by Mrs Leatherbarrow and Mr Bacon visited the Spanish capital, Madrid, to immerse themselves in the language and culture as part of their preparation for the exams. Madrid is very much a Castilian city and the history of Spain is evident at every turn. Bethany Fish remarked that it was 'a very exciting place to visit'. The accommodation at the Hostal Plaza D'Ort proved, Ruth Lundy said, 'an excellent base from which to tour Madrid. The rooms were comfortable and the staff were extremely helpful. They only spoke Spanish, so it was a

perfect opportunity to practise our language skills.'

The group took a bus trip of the main sights of Madrid with a Spanish speaking guide. Visits were made to the Reina Sofia and the Prado art galleries. This was followed by a trip to the fascinating city of Toledo. The group were introduced to the architecture of the region and its Islamic influences. The Spanish Civil War was another interesting aspect seen in the city's famous Alcazar.

Mr Bacon recommended a trip to Segovia where the Roman influence can be seen in what he called 'the magnificently impressive aquaduct' which dominates the city. One day was devoted to coursework and absolutely every opportunity was used to speak Spanish. 'We read Spanish newspapers, watched Spanish newspapers, watched Spanish TV, engaged in conversation with local people. Some of us met up with Spanish friends while others went to the cinema or the theatre,' commented Lisa King.

This was the school's first study visit to Madrid and proved to be an excellent choice. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed themselves and learned a lot from the visit.



COMENIUS



Comenius is part of the European Union Programme Socrates which focuses on education in schools. It supports partnerships between schools which are carrying out collaborative cross-curricular European Education Projects and seeks to promote contact between schools at all levels.

So how does Wath fit in?

We are a part of the programme and are in partnership with three other schools across Europe.

What and where are our partnership schools? We are in partnership with:

- > Trave Gymnasium, Lubeck, Germany
- > Vaci Mihaly Gimnazium, Nograd, Hungary
- > Liceo Classico Gulli e Pennisi, Acireale, Italy

What is the partnership doing?

The partnership is exploring how social issues affect schools

and it has concentrated on employment and the changing nature of the job market. A further joint study will foster links through learning and friendship using electronic communication, fax and the postal service.

What is happening this year?

- In February, Miss Duclos attended a meeting for all of the project co-ordinators in Lubeck, Germany.
- Two Comenius days have run so far this year. Pupils from Y7 to Y12 have taken part and their work displayed in the LSC and on the school web site.
- A further pupil exchange takes place in June with our partner school in Lubeck.
- A Lingua project is being planned with our partner school in Acireale, Italy.
- A final summit meeting for this year will take place in Hungary.

Y11 Record of Achievement Presentation

On the afternoon of May 16th, the pupils of Y11 were presented with their Records of Achievement. These were formally presented by Mrs Hartley, the Chair of Governors, and this was followed by an informal light buffet in which tutors and pupils spent some time together - an opportunity to mark the end of four years together. GERMAN EXCHANGE

This June, Wath was the host school to a visit made by pupils from the Trave Gymnasium in Lubeck, Germany. 25 of our pupils took part and welcomed their German guests into their homes. The first weekend was spent getting to know the host family and the visitor, but the following week was one of activity. There was a look around Manvers and the changes that have occurred there in recent years. This was followed by separate trips to York, Caphouse Colliery in Wakefield and to Rotherham Town Hall. A busy schedule, but an enjoyable one and an exchange in which new friends have been made.

'DRACULA SPECTACULA'

The Drama department has produced some excellent pieces of drama this year and being involved in them has been just as entertaining as actually watching them. In addition to the amazing 'Dracula Spectacula', there



Travels -An Experience of a Lifetime Della Leasley Y12







With a population of over one billion, this country pays homage to five of the world's major religions. There are two main languages, English and Hindi, and 14 other languages are used for official purposes. Yes, you have guessed it! I am talking about India. It is one of the world's poorest nations, with no free compulsory education and neither does it offer much help to the poorer children, who grow up in a difficult environment where every day is a struggle to find food and water. Many children in India, especially girls, are 'given up' as their families cannot afford to keep them. In the area of India I travelled in, many unwanted girls are

taken to the Unique Home in Jallundar, Punjab, where they are left in a 'hole in the wall'. The woman running the home, Prakash Kaur, takes in these girls. She looks after them, feeding them, educating them and providing them with a safe place to live. Just as we arrived, a baby girl was found outside the home, lying beside a dead dog. Lucy is now living safely in the home, thanks to Prakash Kaur.

Scenes such as these are repeated in many other areas of the country. Not all of the unwanted children are lucky enough to be living in an orphanage. Some are left to fend for themselves by living on the streets. Other children are deliberately maimed so that they can then beg on the streets and provide a meagre income for their families. So, in the light of these terrible problems in India, Assistant Chief Constable Martin Davies, Inspector Michael Venables and P.C. Sarinder Kaur Dev, made the decision that it had to be a team from South Yorkshire Police to provide some form of help.

Therefore with £10,000 donated by South Yorkshire Police, 9 police officers and 16 students aged between 16 and 25 from South and West Yorkshire, embarked on the expedition INDIA 2000, on the 15th February 2000, with the hope of:

- developing personal experiences
- developing an understanding between young people of different backgrounds
- developing an understanding and tolerance of different cultures and communities
- > donating educational resources

During the visit, the children at the Prayas Orphanage, south of Delhi, entertained us with a spectacular show of eastern dance and culture. We, in turn, performed a show for the Khalsa College students and the girls from the Unique Home.

We also attended police meetings and made official visits to the British and Indian High Commissions. We visited the Golden Temple at Amritsar, the magnificent Taj Mahal at Agra and we also attended a Sikh wedding. What we did for the street children of India may only seem like a drop in the ocean, but after seeing how many children we had helped at least we can say that it was something. I have learned many things on this visit, not least of which is that there is always someone less fortunate than you.
