



Perhaps you would not expect an old Wathonian to become a Conservative Cabinet Minister, still less to have a meteoric rise in Tory politics - but with WILLIAM HAGUE, that is exactly what happened - and his teachers are not really surprised at all!

'Haggis' could reel off the names of MPs and their constituencies at 14 and did brilliant Harold Wilson impersonations at 16. A member of the very notable sixth form of 1979, he scored straight 'A's at 'A' level and went on to read Politics, Philosophy and Economics at Magdalen College, Oxford. There he was told he could either get a first class degree or be President of the Union: he did both!

In 1987 he stood as Conservative candidate in Wentworth, and was predictably well beaten, but in 1989 he was selected to fight the Richmond by-election and became the last Conservative successfully to hold a Tory seat in a by-election. In 1992 his majority was over 23,000.

He did not stay on the back benches long - personal aide to Norman Lamont, then Chancellor of the Exchequer, Minister for Social Security, Minister for the Disabled, and since July 1995, Secretary of State for Wales and the youngest Cabinet Minister since the 1940s.

His officials are puzzled that their boss likes to climb the Welsh mountains, but he was, after all, the boy who ran up Helvellyn before breakfast on a school trip in 1976. They like his pleasant and relaxed manner and becoming modesty, and we could have told them about that too! William keeps in touch with many Wath contemporaries, and is immensely proud of his old school. He has accepted our invitation to be principal guest at Speech Day in January 1997.

Eddie Kitchen

Amongst the leavers from the Upper Sixth last summer, one person stands out. We are used to success at the highest level in the Sixth Form but the achievement of Eddie Kitchen will always be remembered, for he is the first blind student to have taken 'A' levels and gone on to university from Wath. Eddie's strength of character and constant good humour were an example to all of us; life can be difficult for any student in a large school but he coped splendidly and was uncomplaining. In addition to gaining good GCSE's, 'A' level results and a place at Sunderland University, he was awarded the prestigious Tom Walker trophy when voted as the school's most admired student. Eddie's adorable golden Labrador guide dog Rowan was a star attraction at a full staff meeting last September when he attempted to eat the Head's notes (most regrettably, he wasn't quite fast enough!).



Cambridge Places for 1996

Two Upper Sixth students have been offered places at Cambridge University for October 1996.

Deputy Head Girl, Catherine Gammons, has a place at Jesus College to read Geography. She will study alongside former Head Girl, Clare Bacon, who is studying French and Spanish at the college.

Mrs Mary Addey (1928 - 1996): A Life for Learning

Many of those who crowded into Wath Trinity Methodist Church for Mary Addey's funeral in February reflected her life-long involvement with our school - teachers past and present, former pupils, governors, parents and friends. All wanted to pay tribute to a teacher who inspired affection and respect in both pupils and colleagues.

A former pupil of the school, she returned in 1962 to teach Biology, becoming Senior Teacher and Head of Year 7 in 1972. For 14 years, until her retirement in 1986, every new entrant to the school passed through her expert and caring hands, and all owe her a massive debt for putting them *on the right track* from the start: 'Mrs Addey says....' was as much the watchword in Year 7 Wing as in the Science Block. Her Christianity shone through her teaching, and she believed passionately in the power of education to improve society.

No-one could have done more to enrich the educational experiences of children - school parties to the Lake District, Norfolk Broads, ballet, concerts, Wath tip reclamation project, Dearne Valley UNA. Inside and outside the classroom Mary Addey was totally committed to the welfare of young people. We miss her deeply, but we are proud of the part she played in the shaping of the school that meant so much to her.

On 24 May, Mr Addey and other members of the family will open the 'Mary Addey Garden', created out of the lower quadrangle, and now to be named after her as a lasting memorial to a fine Wathonian.



Sixth Formers Survive Terror Quake!!

The twelve Upper Sixth Spanish students and their three teachers who went to Barcelona for the Catalonia Study Visit in February are back home safe and well after surviving a Force 5 earthquake, Spain's most serious quake for 30 years. What turned out to be another highly successful visit could well have been an appalling multi-death tragedy: fortunately all but two of the party took it all in their stride and didn't even bother to wake up! Head of Sixth Form, Derek Bacon and Joanne Limer were both woken by the 3am tremor and Mr Bacon

(apparently in most attractive light blue pyjamas!) was seen running around the hotel corridors in a panic, screaming "Vamos a morir, vamos a morir!" ("We're going to die, we're going to die!").

The study visit enabled to students to learn much about this region of Spain which has its own language, Catalan, and to enjoy the atmosphere of one of the world's most exciting cities.

Several of the students did two weeks' work experience in the region in the Lower

Sixth and met up again with friends made at that time.

Enterprise Flowers at Wath

This year has seen two important changes to 'Floral Dreams' - the dried flower arranging group which has operated successfully under the guidance of Shelagh Wing of the Art Department. Firstly the group has been re-named 'Dry Design', and secondly it is now being run as a Young Enterprise Company.

Young Enterprise is an international scheme which

encourages young people to plan, organise and run their own business activities. By taking on roles such as Managing Director, Finance Director and Company Secretary, individual students acquire specific business skills. More importantly, perhaps, regular Board Meetings and production sessions enable all group members to develop skills such as teamwork, planning and decision making.

We are grateful to Peter Bysouth (C&C Enquiries, Mexborough) and Jane Littlewood (Rabbit Design, Wombwell) for the time which they have given to support our students.

It is clear that 'Dry Design', A Young Enterprise Company, will be a success, both commercially and as an experience for the students. Well done to all those involved!

New Future for the 'Bottom Quad'

For years now, the 'bottom quad' has been an eyesore, and at last we are able to do something about it, thanks to funding from Barclays 'New Futures'\ award won by Wath pupils last year. This once-derelict area is being turned into a garden and quiet area for pupils use, in a project energetically managed by Mrs Jane Shaw and supported superbly by Mowlem Training. Mowlem Trainees' excellent workmanship has transformed this corner of school into a first class amenity which will be formally opened on 25 May, when it will be dedicated to the memory of Mrs Mary Addey.

This is an expensive project and the award is being backed by fund-raising efforts in school: Y7 have raised £300 towards paving stones and Y8 and Y9 are doing the same to provide benches and picnic tables. 8U are designing a special wall mosaic on an environmental theme. Offers of further help will be welcome.

Y7 First Year Garden

Last year as part of an environmental drive, Year 7 did a survey on how to improve Y7 Wing. They presented their suggestions for change at an assembly to the whole of Y7 and invited Senior Staff and Governors to attend. It was a great success and two of their ideas were acted on immediately.

The part of the staff car park which has been used as a rather dangerous short-cut to our neighbouring infants school was made into a walled garden - a much needed attractive area on a drab site, and an amenity for pupils to enjoy.

The enthusiasm for this was fantastic: pupils from all years, together with their teachers, helped dig up the weeds and put down the topsoil. Brampton environment fund donated £200 for shrubs and Mowlem Training, at no charge, provided the labour for the brick work.

After six weeks of very hard work the garden was finished. This just goes to show that with enthusiasm and determination pupils can make a real difference.



School and College pool their resources

Wath Comprehensive School and Rockingham College are joining forces in a new drive to encourage more people into scientific careers.

Last September, the two establishments launched the

Foundation and Intermediate GNVQ Science Programme, pooling resources and expertise at both sites.

The course is open to school leavers and mature students who want a good grounding

in science.

Programme tutor Mr Walch emphasises that the course is very flexible, needing no previous qualifications.

Willow Weaving and Biomass Project

Groundwork Dearne Valley is working with Wath Comprehensive School on a willow weaving and BIOMASS project that will transform a corner of redundant playing fields into a sitting area with willow structures.

The project is being funded through two national Groundwork initiatives: Autumn Campaign, a planting for wildlife project sponsored by Lloyds Bank Charitable Trust, and BIOMASS, a series of pilot

projects using willow crops sponsored by the Department of the Environment.

The project has two aims.

The first is to provide somewhere pleasant and sheltered for pupils to sit out at lunch and break times.

The second is to provide a willow crop that can be used for two school enterprise initiatives: basket making for the school's Dry Design flower arrangement business and

productions of bark chippings for sale and/or for use in the school grounds.


Basket weaver and environmental artist, Jeff Allen, has worked alongside Year 8 and Year 9 pupils on the design of the site and has introduced them to basket weaving techniques which will be used to create tunnels, arches, seat backs and bins. The young people will be planting the willow crop and weaving the structures on 21 March 1996 with the help

of Jeff and staff from the school, Groundwork Dearne Valley and Rotherham MBC's Countryside Service.

During the winter months, Year 7 students at Wath Comprehensive School took part in the project 'Regeneration of the Dearne'.

The purpose of the project was to provide the opportunity for students to look back over the past 10, 20, 30 years or so and to analyse the changes which have taken place.

The project started with everyone visiting the Heritage Centre at Elsecar where students studied things like transport and road systems, the mining industry, local crafts and changing environment. All students were invited to involve their parents and grandparents in the project so they could tell them about experiences they

might remember.
Coincidentally, most of the students were born at around the time the coal strike began at Cortonwood Colliery at Brampton, and as a result they have grown up in a period of dramatic changes, and it was felt that they should all appreciate the relative stability which the mining industry had brought to the area.

Having said that, an important part of the project was to look at the future and how the area can be revitalised. Students designed and planned how they might change the slag heap landscape and make use of, for example, the redundant NCB sites; they worked with Groundwork Trust, the Earth Centre and Local Planners to investigate

what could be done. They designed a suitable theme motif for a 'T' shirt which they had screen printed onto 250 shirts which were in turn sold (there are still some left if you want one) to their relatives and friends. Looking back it is impossible to say what each student gained from the project, but they undoubtedly picked up something of their heritage, which of course is rightfully theirs.

As the project closed with a 'bopping' competition to the vibrant tones of Jerry Lee Lewis, who knows what they were thinking? They were probably thinking that they were not of that era, that it was all unreal and a long time ago. Well it was.

Changes


In September, the school will have a new Headteacher.

In March pupils in Years 7-10 took part in a production of 'Rainbows Ending' by Noel Greig, performed at school and also at the Rotherham Arts Centre.




The U13 Netball Team (nearly all of whom play in the Hockey Team) got through to the final of their Rotherham Tournament - losing only by two goals to finish runners-up.
