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What is Music?

This is a course for those who wish to develop their skills in Music through studying;

- Rehearsal skills & Live performance
- Planning and Evaluating rehearsals & performances
- The Music Industry & Careers in music

You will also have the choice to develop skills in:

- Auditioning for music roles
- Music Theory
- Listening & Analysing Music
- Music Technology
- Music Promotion
- & many more specific units tailored to your interests

The course is approached very practically and gives you lots of performance opportunities, you will also complete research, plan and evaluate your work through either written work or audio/visual recordings or diaries/blogs.

Why should I study Music?

If you enjoy music and playing an instrument or singing, this is an ideal option for you to develop your skills and interests in Music alongside the opportunity to work with other people.

Music also develops many practical and mental skills such as:

- Decision Making
- Self Discipline
- Teamwork
- Taking Responsibility
- Awareness and sensitivity to others
- Creativity & Inventiveness
- The ability to use your own initiative


Music has been scientifically proven to:

What careers could Music lead to?

A career in music is more than just being a musician, the music industry is a wide career path which encompasses lots of roles in different sectors, see how your career could flourish in one or more of these roles:



In addition, due to the development of transferable skills mentioned above, many students can go onto a wider range of careers such as:

- Marketing
- Retail
- Social Work
- Media & Journalism
- Teaching
- Acting & Stage Performance

What will I study?

At Wath Academy we study the RSL Music Practitioner syllabus which is covered through two core units and at least three optional units adding up to a total of **90 credits**. One of these units is assessed by the exam board and the rest are assessed by your teachers. All units are detailed on the next page.

As well as the optional units, it is possible to select alternative units which are tailored to your interests.

How will I be assessed?

The core unit 'Careers in Music' and the optional units will be assessed during the course at various points. You will be given written feedback once before then submitting for final assessment, which will be sent off to exam board moderators. Each unit submission is unique, you may choose to submit written work, recorded audio, presentations, videos, blogs or vlogs. The external unit 'Rehearsal skills and Live music performance' will be assessed solely by the exam board and consists of written work and a live video performance.

All units develop distinctive skills for the music industry, crossing over and aligning to foster a well rounded musical experience.

Units of Study

Core Unit: Planning for a Career in Music

Non-exam assessment: Internally assessed, externally moderated. (15 credits)

You will undertake activities relating to your overarching career aims in music.

You will produce:

- *A personal knowledge and skills analysis on current, specialist knowledge & skills, employability & study skills.*
- *A learning and skills development plan to follow your chosen career path*
- *An evaluation of your potential progress into two music roles*
- *An analysis of your progress and learning throughout the unit and an aspirational career action plan*

This unit will run throughout the course and be completed by the end of Year 13.

Core Unit: Rehearsal Skills & Live Music Performance

Examined Planned Performance: Externally assessed. (30 Credits)

You will participate in the planning, rehearsal and performance of a set lasting between 15-20 minutes based on a brief from the exam board:

You must perform the set live in front of an audience and the performance will be filmed.

You will produce:

- *A Rehearsal aims document and a plan for your rehearsals.*
- *A record of your rehearsals throughout the process*
- *A final performance and evaluation of the process*

This unit will be completed between December 2023 & April 2024

Optional Unit: Improving Instrumental Performance

Non-exam assessment: Internally assessed, externally moderated. (15 credits)

You will maximise your development as an instrumentalist or singer.

You will produce:

- *A personal instrument critique*
- *An analysis of your own skills and a plan of action to improve them*
- *An evidence log of your rehearsal process throughout the year*
- *An evaluation of your progress and learning throughout the unit and an action plan for future development*

This unit will run throughout Y12 and be completed in the final term.

Optional Unit: Practical Musicianship

Non-exam assessment: Internally assessed, externally moderated. (15 credits)

You will learn to listen, internalise and reproduce musical elements and ideas & to communicate them to others.

You will produce:

- *A recreation of a chosen piece of music.*
- *A reflection of your learning.*
- *A masterclass of musical elements and ideas*
- *An evaluation of your progress and learning throughout the unit and an action plan for future development*

This unit will run during Y12 and be completed in the final term.

Optional Unit: Auditioning for Music

Non-exam assessment: Internally assessed, externally moderated. (15 credits)

You will develop skills to participate effectively in an audition.

You will produce:

- *An analysis of personal goals in relation to audition techniques*
- *A profile of an audition for a specific role*
- *A video of your audition*
- *An evaluation of your progress and learning throughout the unit and an action plan for future development*

This unit will run during Y12 and be completed in the final term.
